

Global Warming

2023 was the warmest year on earth since record keeping started

Rising temperature is caused by rising carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere

In Wisconsin


- + 2023-24 was the warmest winter ever recorded
- + February 2024 was the warmest February
- + Wisconsin just had its first February tornado ever
- + Lake Ice on Lake Superior was the least ever

+ Sixth mass extinction (driven primarily by human activity)

Rapid local development

- + Town of Verona 100 new homes 2017-23, 100 more in planning stages.
- + City of Verona 30% growth forecast 2020 to 2030 14,000 people → 18,000 people

The City annexes about ½ sq mile of Town annually

The Town also develops about ½ sq mile annually

The original Town of Verona was 36 sq miles

Development is planned


Land protection is not

- + Both the Town and the City have "Plan Commissions" that meet monthly to discuss and approve upcoming developments
- + Neither have any similar land protection committees

Development leads to increased global warming

- + Each traditionally built large house emits 10 to 15 Tons of CO2 per year
- + Each car associated with the house emits 5
 Tons of CO2/year

What can I do about it?

You can have a **HUGE** impact locally

- + You may not be able to do much about the wars in Ukraine or Gaza.
- + You can have A LOT of impact about how our community deals with development and responds to climate change

Get informed about your local government.

- + Sign up for local government information about meetings, agendas, minutes of the board, the council, the plan commissions
- + Go to meetings and see who is making decisions.
- + Talk with them after or outside of the meetings and let them know your concerns
- + Consider running for office YOURSELF (almost all local elections have no opponent).

Global warming responses

- + Request that solar panels be put on all government buildings
- Request that new construction be all electric (no gas line)
 solar panels, heat pumps, geothermal heat and cooling
- + Request that EV charging stations be built locally
- + Request that Verona become a "Sol-Smart" community
- + Make your home all electric!

Lots of Federal money available for climate change

- + Bipartisan infrastructure law (BIL) and Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) made millions of dollars available to deal with climate change
- + For example 30% instant rebate on solar panels
- Dane County Office of Energy and Climate Change has lots of information
- + Ask your representative what they're doing about it.

Land Protection

- + Don't wait to try to stop a development project once it's been proposed (you're usually too late)
- + Help start a land protection program in Verona
- + Purchase of Developmental Rights (PDR) is a technique that has been successful in other Towns and Cities to protect:
- + > Wetlands
- + > Farmlands
- + > Natural Areas

Land protection slows development

- + Groundswell has indicated interest in working with Verona to protect land in the Sugar River Valley if we can hire a city +/or town employee to work with them
- + Both the City and the Town can afford it

Town Citizens want land protected

- + A 2018 Town survey showed that 80% favored:
 - > "environmental and wildlife preservation"
 - > "preservation of large (>40 acres) wooded areas"
 - > "preservation of the Sugar River Watershed"
 - 70% of survey respondents wanted the Town to:
 - > "connect bicycle and walking trails, including the Ice Age Trail"
 - > "preserve farmland"

Encourage City or Town Initiatives

- + Clean Energy Resolution
- + Sol-smart designation
- + Sustainability Plan
- + LEED certified buildings
- + EV charging stations





Together, we can make a difference

- + Local efforts can have a huge effect and are VERY LIKELY to work
- + Small numbers of advocates can produce big changes
- + Becoming aware and informed is the first step

Sustain Verona

- + First meeting March 19
- + Monthly meetings since
- + We met with Mayor Diaz, and other members of the former City Sustainability Committee and in September, the City re-started the Committee!
- + We started a Webpage https://sustainverona.com/
- + We started Facebook and Instagram accounts
- We're looking to get Verona residents interested in helping to prevent global warming!

City of Verona sustainability efforts to date

- + 2019 Sustainability Resolution R-19-018
- + COV Sustainability Committee formed 2019, met 6 times until 2021 but not since until now.
- The Committee has had two meetings and has recommended budget money to put solar panels on City buildings

Meanwhile... in nearby cities

+ City of Fitchburg

Passed a Sustainability Resolution, Hired a Sustainability Specialist Solar Panels on all City buildings, Awarded Sol-smart Bronze level Built LEED Certified buildings, hired consultant to develop long term plan

+ City of Middleton

Hired Sustainability Coordinator, have an active city committee

Has received numerous grants and awards for Sustainability efforts

Gives out annual awards to citizens and groups for Sustainability efforts

More Neighboring city efforts ...

+ City of Sun Prairie

Sustainability coordinator, committee

Won PLATINUM Sol-smart award, 2nd in nation

Dane County Climate Champion 2021

Promotes EVs, Heat Pumps, other residential efforts to decrease Greenhouse Gases



Dane County Sustainability Efforts

- + Office of Energy and Climate change est. 2017
- + Implemented Climate Action Plan in 2020
- + Awards Climate Champions each year
- + 100% renewable electricity in 2023
- + 2024 Sol-Smart Platinum award

First county in US to receive this award



What does SV want the City of Verona to do?

+ Replicate successful efforts of other cities!


Listen to the **Sustainability Committee**

Hire a **Sustainability Coordinator**

Look at 2019 resolution and act on it!


Partner with Dane County and other cities to reduce GHG emissions



Town of Verona Land Protection

- + In 2016 the City and the Town agreed how to divide up the land for development
- + There was no plan made for conserving or protecting any of the lands

City's plans for land preservation and development




Town's View of Land Preservation and Development

Orange and yellow boxes are open to development or already developed

Light green is "Transitional Ag" for future development

Dark Green is "Farmland Preservation"



What's left in the Town for Preservation and how is it protected?


+ Farmland Preservation program

\$10/acre tax break

10-15-year horizon

Not permanent - can be broken with a small fine

Not applied to natural areas



Conservation Easements provide permanent land protection


- + Purchase of Developmental Rights (PDR)
- + Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)

These programs (and others) can use state and federal funds to permanently protect land from development

The Towns of Dunn, Westport, Black Earth, Dunkirk have used this method to permanently protect lands from development


Town of Dunn Protected lands

Partnered with
Groundswell (land
trust) for 30 years to
protect land with a PDR
program



Town's proposed PDR program halted in 2022 by board vote

- + Town's Natural and Recreational Areas Committee (NRAC) was in the process of developing a proposed PDR program to help conserve lands in the Town
- + Board vote 4-1 to cease any further efforts, before the plan could be fully developed and presented to citizens



What does Sustain Verona want the Town of Verona to do?

- + Reconsider starting a PDR program and let voters decide
- + Work with the City of Verona to comprehensively protect land
